***** IMPORTANT: *GEN DOBRY!* AND EMAIL *****

For more than eighteen years now, we've been sending out issues of *Gen Dobry!* each month by bulk email. As one might expect, there have been problems along the way; but we've always managed to deal with them.

Until now. For reasons we still don't understand, a large number of people signed up to receive *Gen Dobry!* have been complaining that they don't want to receive our monthly issues. They complained to their email services. The result was that a huge percentage of copies we send out are bounced right back to us, before the recipient ever sees them. Polish Roots President Don Szumowski informed me that Gmail, Yahoo, and AOL are just three of the providers who have, essentially, blacklisted us.

This is baffling. We most definitely do NOT want to spam anybody! The two-step verification process whereby you sign up to receive this publication is supposed to make sure it goes only to people who really want to receive it. How is it happening, then, that people who signed up to receive *Gen Dobry!* complain when it shows up in their inboxes? It's beyond me.

Until just a couple of days ago, we weren't sure what to do next. We hated the idea of giving up on email, even though downloading the monthly PDF from the PolishRoots site has always been a reliable way to get each issue (and one a lot of our readers rely on).

However, several people we talked to had good things to say about the MailChimp delivery service. Don Szumowski has also had favorable experiences with it from another group he belongs to. He decided our best move was to switch from the service we had been using and start using MailChimp. All this has been happening right at the end of March, and we're still scrambling to catch up.

A key point is, we may be unable to transfer the list of subscribers we've been using. That's not entirely a bad thing, if that list really did include people who have no wish to receive *Gen Dobry!* But we need to build a new list; and that means we have to ask you to sign up again.

Subject: Nazwiska-Polskie.pl

Editor – This isn't really a letter to the editor, but a note posted to Facebook's Polish Genealogy group on a subject I mentioned in the last issue, the website <<http://nazwiska-polskie.pl>>. The man who posted the note, Lucjan Gabriel Cichocki, is a gifted researcher, and I felt his comments were well worth repeating.

A friend of mine told me about the website recently and I admit I was impressed with it. It shows the distribution of a last name around Poland and appears to be far more accurate than the Moikrewni site as the numbers are broken down into villages rather than "powiats." The database is like ten years old but still :-). What you do is type in a name and zoom in a map that comes up afterwards, numbers should appear indicating how many occurrences of the name were in the area in early 21st century.
