***** WORDS – ESPECIALLY NAMES – MATTER *****

Gary Mokotoff, editor of the e-zine *Nu? What's New?*, devoted to Jewish research, wrote an interesting piece in the 12 August 2018 issue. I've been thinking about it a lot.

The title of the article was “Let's Stop Referring to ‘Jews’ When Discussing Eastern Europe.” The title might leave you wondering what he was advocating, but the article makes it clear. He notes, “One of the contributions to anti-Semitism in Eastern Europe is that Jews are referred to as if they are not part of the general population.” In other words, you see references all the time to “Poles and Jews” or “Lithuanians and Jews.” We don't have any problem calling Jews in America simply “Americans.” Jews who live in Canada are “Canadians.” No one seems compelled to separate “Jews” from “Americans” or “Canadians.” Why do we often do it in reference to Poles and Jews in eastern Europe?

This has struck me before. As a linguist, I probably obsess a little too much over the precise choice of words. But I feel Gary has a point. Talking about “Poles and Jews” is one more way of separating people, making the other guy “them” or “the aliens.” Sadly, Gary noted that you often hear Jews do the same thing, insisting they are Jews, not citizens of the country they live in.

Doesn't it make a lot more sense to talk about “relations between Polish Christians and Polish Jews” than “relations between Poles and Jews?” And of course, this choice of expression does not apply only to Jews vs. Christians. We have all sorts of ways of splitting people into “us” and “them,” and I'm sure you can think of examples from the daily news.

Now, sometimes, expressions of this sort are just a verbal shortcut, with no malice intended. But the Nazi rule over Europe showed us what kind of consequences can come from isolating a specific group. (And before you say, “I'm tired of hearing about how the Nazis persecuted the Jews,” don't ever forget, the Nazis treated Polish Christians little better than Polish Jews. Millions of Polish Christians ended their lives in concentration camps, too.)

For that matter, talking about “Polish concentration camps” is often just a shortcut, meaning only “death camps located in Polish territory occupied by the Nazis.” But an awful lot of Poles and Polish Americans see red when they encounter that phrase, and I don't blame them. It is too easy to misunderstand it as meaning the Poles somehow tolerated or approved of the camps. History should have taught us the problem with slurring over facts. We've seen how viciously humans can treat each other; we can't afford to say hateful things and then protest, “Oh, you know what I mean.” No, I don't. Why don't you say what you mean?

I don't have much tolerance for “political correctness,” and I admit, discussions like this can lead to that abomination all too easily. But wouldn't we all be better off if we just insist on paying a little attention to what comes out of our mouths? Not obsess, not split hairs, not insult each other, but simply think before we talk, and call things by their right names? I wish we'd give it a try.

Czesław Jaracz posted a note to the Facebook Polish Genealogy group, recommending this search engine, Polish and English. *Osoba* means “person,” *Miejsce* means “place.” *Imię* means “First name, given name,” and *Wpisz imię* means “Enter first name.” Similarly, *Wpisz nazwisko* means “Enter surname.” If you click on *Miejsce* instead of *Osoba*, *Wpisz nazwę miejscowości* means “Enter name of the locality.” Clicking on the little keyboard icon brings up a keyboard onscreen you can use to input the name. With the keyboard showing, clicking on AltGr brings up the Polish letters with diacritical marks. *Szukaj* means “Search,” and *Szukanie zaawansowane* means, what else, “Advanced search.” *Wyszukiwanie przybliżone* means “Approximate search,” that is, you’re not asking for an exact match; *Wyszukiwane dokładne*, “Exact search.” The home page of the group offering this search engine is at <<http://genealogiapolska.pl/>>, and English is one of the input languages recognized.

Jan explained there are three distinct collections, Castle Garden, 1820-1891; Ellis Island, 1892-1924; and New York, New York Passenger and Crew Lists, 1909, 1925-1957. You can search and view records for free on the Ellis Island site, but you have to purchase a download. You can access, view, and download the digitized record for free on FamilySearch. Much of this is old news; what’s new is the coverage from 1820 all the way through 1957.
